LETTER FROM PASTOR ROD

Always Being Made New.... Again

In light of Holy Week and Easter, I'd like to consider once again our tagline for 2017, Always Being Made New. My honored seminary professor, the later Dr. Walter Bouman, confessed many times that what scared him most as a pastor and preacher during Holy Week, wasn't the question, "what if it's not true" but rather, "what if it is true?" If it is true that Jesus has overcome death, "that news," Dr. Bouman said, "changes everything."

The Apostle Paul writes in Romans 6, "What shall we say then? Are we to continue in

sin that grace may abound? By no means! How can we who died to sin still live in it? Do you not know that all of us who have been baptized into Christ Jesus were baptized into his death? We were buried therefore with him by baptism into death, in order that, just as Christ was raised from the dead by the glory of the Father, we too might walk in newness of life.

Dr. Bouman was right. If it's true, and we believe it to be absolutely true, that Jesus Christ died and rose again, everything changes. We too have died with him, in order that, just as Christ was raised from the dead by the glory of the Father, we too might walk in newness of life. If there was no resurrection, then nothing has changed and we can go back to life as we know it – back to the daily grind, thinking only of self, grabbing from life what we can get and hoping for the best. But if Jesus has been raised, then we too with him walk in newness of life.

With Christ's death and resurrection, so comes my death and resurrection. Everything changes. Every day everything changes. Every day I am called to return to my baptism, to die to self and to be raised up by God a new creation – a new person. God wants, not only to tweak my life, but God wants to reorient my whole life, from self to neighbor; from darkness to light; from stagnation to growth; from death to life. This way of life is an everyday way of life. As the Holy Spirit lives and reigns in our lives day-by-day we are always being made new.

After Jesus death but before his resurrection, Peter said to the other disciples, "I'm going fishing" (John 21). The other disciples said to him, "We're going with you." Why did they go fishing? Were they hungry? Their best friend had just been murdered, so I have a hard time believing they had much of an appetite. Did they just want an escape from their problems? Perhaps. I believe that at this point in the story the disciples believe Jesus is dead and will stay dead. I believe they are going back to the way things were before. He's dead and nothing has changed. Peter was going home to get to work; to provide for his family; to once again take up his family profession.

Once the disciples see the risen Christ however their whole life is reoriented. They leave their fish nets behind for good and become fishers of people and the church is born. Dear friends, ask yourself how Jesus is calling you to a total reorientation. What is it that has been consuming your life; that has taken center stage; that has received your time and attention? Have you been thinking only of yourself, your family, your clan? Jesus is calling you to

something bigger, to a world longing for love, light and life. I pray that this Holy Week you are given eyes to see the living Lord Jesus and that seeing Him your life will be totally and daily reoriented to Jesus and God's will for yourself, your neighbor, and all that exists.

IMMANUEL KIDS

APRIL

Our English word April comes from the Latin Aprilis, the second month of the ancient Roman calendar, a month dedicated to the Roman goddess Venus. Venus was worshipped by the Romans as the goddess of love, sex, beauty, and fertility. Even though we as Christians do not worship or even acknowledge Venus as a goddess, it makes a little bit of sense that our second month of spring is named for the goddess of fertility since April is the month when we begin to till and plant our fields.

The longer I live the more my awareness grows that much in our society was and remains built upon the same pillars that Roman society was built upon. I'm certainly not the first Christian to have this insight. For centuries Christians have been implementing Christian ideals and holidays to replace the Roman ideals and holidays. I'd like to do that with April. Below I have used April as an acronym connecting each letter with action that leads us in God's ways.

A: Awaken: In Matthew 24:42 Jesus says, "Therefore, stay awake, for you do not know on what day your Lord is coming." Jesus wants to find us doing His Father's work when he returns.

<u>P: Pray:</u> Lamentations 3: 22-23 "The steadfast love of the Lord never ceases; his mercies never come to an end;

they are new every morning, great is your faithfulness." Seek God's mercy through prayer.

R: Read: Psalm 119:105-"Your word is a lamp to my feet and a light to my path." Read God's Word; it brings life.

<u>I: Interpret:</u> In Luke 12:56, Jesus says "You hypocrites! You know how to interpret the appearance of earth and sky, but why do you not know how to interpret the present time?" Interpret God's word for your day.

<u>L: Listen/Learn/Lead:</u> Psalm 143:10 – "Teach me to do your will, for you are my God! Let your good Spirit lead me on level ground! Jesus is our teacher who leads us and empowers us to lead others through our witness.

I invite you to take these five steps in response to the good news of Easter. As you do, you will quickly learn that our God is the God of seed time and harvest; of fertility and growth, and as you partake daily in these five activities your heart will bear fruit for the Kingdom of God.

Holy Week: A Can't Miss

It is that time of year again. The time of year where we make the final push to Easter. But, there is one part of this season that I hope you will not miss. Please don't miss Holy week. And I am not only talking about you coming to worship during holy week, which I do hope you do, but I am talking about making sure you don't skip out on Holy Week. How easy is it to come on Palm Sunday and wait a week to come back on Easter? How easy is it to skip the middle of this week? It can be easy. But let me ask you this, what is the point of Easter if there is no Good Friday or Maundy Thursday? Really, think about that for a minute. What is the point. There can be no Easter without these events, and without these events, Easter can lose its punch.

On Maundy Thursday, we see Jesus wash the feet of others, give us the first communion, and go out to the garden to pray. And Good Friday sees Jesus suffer and die for us on the cross where in John we hear Jesus say, "It is Finished." (John 19:30) and in Matthew we hear a Roman proclaim, "Truly this was the Son of God." (Matthew 27:54). We need to hear the ultimate sacrifice of Jesus, to know how much he did for us. To remember in that moment, he took all of our sins past, present and future upon himself, that he was willing to give his own life up for us.

And why do we need to hear these stories again, because to me it helps us to not take Easter for granted. I have always loved Holy week, and for some reason the Crucifixion story has always been one I have liked, as strange as it sounds for a death story to be my favorite. But I think it is because it does set-up Easter for me. It makes it more than another holiday, it makes me want to celebrate and shout Alleluia on Easter morning, to remind me that yes Jesus did all this, but he also came back for me and for you. Because of this, sin, death and the devil no longer control me. And I hope you take the time to come to worship during Holy Week, and if not that take the time to read the scriptures on Holy Week events, read a children's book on the events, watch a movie like the Passion of the Christ or another Jesus movie and stop reading and watching after he is laid in the tomb. Allow yourself some space to remember what Jesus has done for you come on Easter morning, you can shout with joy that we no longer remain stuck in Good Friday and a world full of death, but instead a new world, and Easter world full of new life.

Jerusalem Journal: Daily Bread

Plastic bags hang on the outside of dumpsters, tied shut and weighted down by bread. Here it is a sin to throw bread away while others are hungry. Leftovers are left for others. Yesterday's bread today becomes someone else's daily bread.

Now I pass by, often oblivious. One day while following a man and his daughter in the car ahead of us, we watched as he scraped the bag off the hook and set the meal on his dash.

This is what holiness looks like, I think. An extended table. A sharing of abundance. An anonymity for those who want it. A placing of food in a common location where everyone must pass by. A compassion to keep the bread outside the trash and off the ground.

"When you reap the harvest of your land, you shall not reap

to the very edges of your field, or gather the gleanings of your harvest; you shall leave them for the poor and for the alien: I am the Lord your God" (Leviticus 23:22).

Jesus was asked to name the most important commandment. You shall love the Lord your God with all your heart, soul, mind, strength (Deuteronomy 6:5) and you shall love your neighbor as yourself (Leviticus 19:18). To love God is to love your neighbor. In Hebrew, a word for worship and the word for service are rooted together in the word avad.

On Maundy Thursday, so named for Jesus' Mandatum (Latin: Mandate), we are given a new commandment: Love one another as I have loved you (John 13:34).

Worship and service need no definite borders. We cannot keep the sacred from the profane (and vice versa). Holiness is not a line in the sand but a circle, ever expanding and ever drawing together.

Christian Freedom and Worship Travis Beck

In 1520, Luther wrote his famous treatise on Christian ethics: The Freedom of the Christian. Drawing on the letters of Paul and Luther's own lectures on Paul's letter to the Galatians, Luther outlines how he understands the Christian life, summed up in his well-known paradox: "A Christian is a perfectly free lord of all subject to none; a Christian is a perfectly dutiful servant of all, subject to all."

For Luther, Christian freedom is a spiritual freedom. The Christian is not magically set free from political obligations, bodily illness, poverty, and other earthly trials and tribulations. It is an inner freedom, a freedom of the soul. Neither sickness or health, wealth or poverty, fortune or crisis, or any other external force either profits or harms this spiritually free person that dwells within us. This inner person lives not "by bread alone, but by every word that proceeds from the mouth of God," as Jesus says.

For this reason, part of worship is devoted to the reading and preaching of the Word—the Gospel, the "good news." Luther writes: "To preach Christ means to feed the soul, make it righteous, set it free, and save it, provided it believes the preaching. Faith alone is the saving and efficacious use of the Word of God... The Word of God cannot be received and cherished by any works whatever but only by faith. Therefore it is clear that, as the soul needs only the Word of God for its life and righteousness, so it is justified by faith alone and not any works; for if it could be justified by anything else, it would not need the Word, and consequently it would not need faith."

What then is the role of good works? They are not for personal gain but for building up the neighbor: "Insofar as a Christian is free, no works are necessary. Insofar as a Christian is a servant,

all kinds of works are done." They are also done for spiritual discipline: "these works serve the purpose of disciplining the body and purifying it of all evil desires." We can think of our worship practices as "works." Musical styles, the prayers, the readings all of these things are unnecessary. By themselves, they neither help nor hinder our spiritual freedom. But disciplining ourselves to certain practices can help protect us from personal agendas, desires, and whims. They prevent any one person or group from inflicting their personal worship ideal on the rest of the congregation. Again, Luther: "[Ceremonies] are to be given the same place in the life of a Christian as models and plans have among builders and artisans. They are prepared, not as a permanent structure, but because without them nothing could be built or made. When the structure is complete the models and plans are laid aside." They are a guide; they give us direction and restrain our personal tastes for the sake of the body as a whole.

We can do almost anything we want in worship, for the Christian is a perfectly free lord of all, subject to none. But we discipline ourselves to certain orders and traditions, making exceptions where it is prudent and necessary for the sake of hospitality and the building up of the body of Christ, for the Christian is a perfectly dutiful servant of all, subject to all. Traditions help temper the spirit of the age, the addiction to novelty, or change for its own sake, and so we use tradition as the bedrock, the starting point for our worship. But at the same time, we allow worship to be a living, breathing thing, always growing to accommodate our ever-changing needs, while challenging ourselves to grow in new directions.

ALWAYS BEING MADE NEW By what we read and watch NEW ESPECIALLY FOR MEN:

- 1. <u>Tenacious</u> How does one man fight ALS, care for his son who has spina bifida, and coach a high school football team to an incredible record? That is Jeremy Williams' life in Georgia and featured on TV's "Extreme Makeover: Home Edition". This is the rest of the story you don't want to miss.
- 2. A Dream So Big: Our Unlikely Journey to End the Tears of Hunger by Steve Plifer with Gregg Lewis. The setting is a boarding school in Kenya for one year. The main characters are Steve and Nancy Plifer whose eight day old son died. Steve is leaving his job as a corporate executive who managed 9,000 computer software consultants to feed and teach starving African children. Read to find out if he is able to achieve his goals.
- 3. Homeless at Harvard by John Frame is both a biography and an autobiography, a heartwarming true story. Spending ten weeks among the homeless on the streets of Harvard Square one summer, Frame writes about the people he meets: Chubby John, who offered Frame a tent; George, the first homeless person he met; Dane, a former cocaine addict; and Neal, a deeply spiritual alcoholic who may be dying. These four men speak through Frame and you will not forget their words.
- 4. Frederick: A Story of Boundless Hope by Frederick Ndabaramiye and Amy Parker. This biography spans from 1994 to present day in Rwanda. What killers meant for harm to Frederick, God intended for good. Read this incredible story and you will become a believer of the impossible.

NEW ESPECIALLY FOR WOMEN:

1. <u>Fifteen Minutes</u> by Karen Kingsbury is an eyeopening can't-put-it-down book about the behind the scenes of two reality shows: "America's Got Talent" and "American Idol". This is fiction but its burning question, 'How does one stay true to God?' is very real.

- 2. Atlas Girl by Emily T Wierenga is her memoir of battling teenage anorexia, leaving home at age 18, and traveling across three continents to find God. - 4. The Artist's Daughter by Alexandra Kuykendall is her search for answers to these three questions: Am I Loveable? Am I Loved? Am I Loving? In this memoir she examines her childhood with her world-traveling mother and her absent artist father, as well as her marriage and motherhood. The board reviewed the agenda for the teacher in-service. The Lenten Fair will be held April 5 from 5:30-6:40. The station topics and activities for this year were organized and aligned with volunteers. There will be seven stations including Shrove Tuesday/Ash Wednesday, Palm Sunday, Maundy Thursday, Good Friday, Easter Day, New Life, and Symbols & Facts of Lent and Easter. Vacation Bible School (VBS) will be held June 5-9. The board discussed the substantial increase in the VBS curriculum cost for this year. There will be a suggested donation of \$5 per child and a late registration fee of \$10 per child to cover the rushed shipping costs of late registration.

The February financials noted a loss for the month of -\$4,030.79. Year-to-date, after two months of 2017, we are at a loss of -\$10,812.36. We were unable to pay for benefits this month on time and that was over \$7,000. We likely need to consider a loan or a line of credit, which will be discussed with the Council.

The Board heard about a few repairs at the parsonage. Some work will be done to the nursery (upstairs) soon. The Board also discussed Wednesday night meals, the 13th month stewardship initiative and continued discussion on updates to flooring at HFLC.

Bink Keller will be joining our Committee next month. We have an ask out to one other individual to join us.

Mission and Outreach

Steve Olmstead gave devotions on praying to God and thanking him for "me". We are all an original you like a designer label. We have \$600 in our Hunger Mission Funds.

We gave money to Stop Hunger campaign and their total stands at \$15,900 which includes \$1,345 to be used as seed money. The Lenten offering recommendation that we gave to the Council was approved with $\frac{1}{2}$ the offering going to our missionaries and $\frac{1}{2}$ toward the general fund.

Our budget to provide for the missionaries is \$5,000 a year. They will be doing a couple home visits, the one in July will be the Minnesota Synod area. Jaci will see if they can visit us in July during our picnic. (They said yes!)

A proposal to change the time of our meetings to 5:00 was made by Jaci and seconded by Ken. The board approved the time change which will enable Council Member representative Brody Hopp to attend our meetings.

June 9-11 is the WIS Assembly. We discussed our offering recipients (\$20,000 synod goal) and they will be for the Sudanese Ministry in Council Bluffs and the Latino Ministry in Denison. Also, they are "Opening Doors" to health care in Tanzania. There is a huge opportunity in making different kits, such as Hospice, Newborn or Health. The second Friday in May is when our church works on kits and quilt assembling.

Board members discussed the large projects vs. small projects for fund raising for missions. General consensus was that the smaller projects keep the mission emphasis in the fore front. Steve closed with a prayer which was the lyrics to the song "Father Help Me to Be.

Parish Life

Immanuel's women have been a part of an agency that assists victims of poverty, disease, hunger war, disasters and persecution. Evangelical churches in the world formed Lutheran World Relief (LWR) where over 100,000 women volunteers in churches around the world gather clothing, school and personal items and soap. These items are packed in boxes to be sent to people in disaster situations. In year 2015 more than 7 million were served by LWR. Needs of people living in poverty and disaster were assessed and it was found that quilts were most needed. Quilts were used as storage bags as people moved, wandering from war to safety could be easily moved as masses of people wandered from war to safety. They also were bright and beautifully made to bring love and hope to lives of chaos. Other items of survival and civility were added to LWR projects. Immanuel makes quilts, gathers blankets, school items, personal care kits and SOAP. Twice a year we pack these items, deliver them to a relay point (First Lutheran Church, Albert Lea) then, trucked to Minneapolis to Baltimore and around the world.
