Letter from Pastor Rod

Early on the First Day of the Week

John's Gospel begins with the words, "In the beginning..." If you think, you will remember that you've heard these words somewhere before. Oh, yes, in Genesis. These are the opening words of the Bible. John is intentional about helping his readers understand God's work of renewing the good creation that has fallen into disrepair due to sin and death.



According to John's Gospel, Jesus is the Word of God made flesh. Jesus has come to take on the powers that

hold creation hostage to sin and death and to liberate the beloved creation from death's grip. John also connects the death of Jesus to the slaughtering of the pascal lambs sacrificed by the Israelite community to remember God's work of liberating them from slavery in Egypt. John the Baptizer proclaims of Jesus, "Behold, the Lamb of God who takes away the sin of the world."

As chapter twenty opens in John's Gospel, the author begins with the words, "Early on the first day of the week." The resurrection of Jesus symbolizes for all creation a new beginning; a return to the "first day" of a new creation. In John's theology, the resurrected Jesus becomes the liberator of all creation, setting it free from the death grip of the devil. "For God so loved the world that he gave his only Son that all who believe in (trust in) him will not parish but have eternal life," John writes in chapter three.

Easter is our celebration of Jesus' victory over sin and death, not only for himself, but for all of creation. Easter is a celebration of the risen one's resurrected and eternal presence. Jesus has indeed returned to the Father to sit at God's right hand, but at the same time, Jesus hasn't gone anywhere. By the power of his abiding Spirit, Jesus remains with the beloved creation to continue the work of blessing and renewal.

As we seek to build community in the name and likeness of Jesus Christ, we, the people who make up the body of Christ known as Immanuel Lutheran Church, will strive to gather ourselves and others around this life changing story of our Lord who died and was raised. We will be focused on the blessing of our God who, in Jesus, forgives our sins, and sets us into a new relationship with God and one another and we will strive to forgive as we have been forgiven. We will strive to build community that is welcoming and inclusive of all people. We will strive to feed the hungry as we gather to be fed and have our hunger satisfied by Jesus who gives us himself as food and drink. We will live as disciples who share life's joys and sorrows and remember that in the resurrected one, each and every day is a new beginning for us and for all the creation.

I pray this Holy Week and Easter that you will meet the one who died and who has been raised, and in that meeting, you will come to see God's work to free you from the power of sin and death that you may live in the rhythm of dying and rising in him each day until we, together grow into the fullness of Jesus. Join us for Holy Week and Easter and in the mission that we share of bearing God's redeeming word to all the world.

Because you belong to Jesus, his victory is your victory. In Baptism you have been connected with Jesus in a death like his so that you will most certainly be connected with him in a resurrection like his. All glory, laud, and honor to you, redeemer King, to whom the lips of children made sweet hosannas ring" is a song not only for Palm Sunday, but for every day. Jesus is worthy of our praise, glory, laud, and honor, for he is truly our life-giving King who takes away our sin and gives us the victorious and triumphant life.

The members of the board met via ZOOM on March 9 at 4:45 p.m. Those present were: Becky Stumme, Ken Korth, Jaci Thorson, Chad Kozitza, Larry and Sharen Rieffer. For devotions Sharen read from "Christ in Our Home" based on Psalm 107:19 about "The Goodness of God". New Council member, Ben Arentson will be serving on M&O.

First quarter mission emphasis for 2022 is Hunger Issues where any mission monies would go towards these three causes—in equal amounts: Local food band, Immanuel's Wednesday night meals and Lutheran World Hunger relief. Gifts so far at meeting time-\$459.60. A March noisy offering will be taken on March 20 and 23. We will also serve coffee 'for hunger' on March 20.

Lenten Offerings will be going to LSI (Lutheran Services in Iowa) which among many other services helps to settle the Afghan refugees in various areas in Iowa.

The board discussed April's mission emphasis and it was decided to be current with the need of the Ukrainian people and direct our mission monies to Lutheran Disaster Response for the Eastern Europe Crisis Response. (See separate article on cover page.)

May and June mission monies will most likely be designated toward our missionary, Karen Anderson, in Santiago, Chile. To date, we have received \$225 for Karen towards the \$5,000 yearly commitment.

Becky Stumme has been in contact with Megan Gabriell of Waldorf in regard to what we can do to help International and in-need students. Some items currently needed are: pans, lightweight coats, plates, glasses, cutting boards and bowls. (See separate article on page 3.)

The Board of Trustees met on March 14, 2022 at the church and by zoom. February income was \$35,069.83 and expenses were \$51,098.03 with a negative \$16,023.20 for the month. February expenses included \$4,900 insurance payment and income in January included a \$10,000 donation reported in January. 2021 February was a negative (\$15,560.05).

Endowment: Nothing new.

Property Committee: Sump pumps were replaced in the elevators by Nelson Plumbing.

Personnel Committee: Policy handbook item #1250 Sexual Harassment is still being worked on.

New Business: Dave Melby will conclude being worship and music coordinator at the end of the summer.

Old Business: a.) Bethany Lutheran Staff sharing and Quarterly vitality group update: The vitality group will add Kathy Lewerke and Josh Banta and Jerry Apple are continuing to serve. They meet quarterly.

Council met on March 14, 2022, with an in Person/Zoom Hybrid format. Eleven members and both Pastors were in attendance. Meeting was called to order by President Daryl Krieger and February minutes were approved.

Pastor Zech reported that the Lenten season is off to a quick start with a very busy day on Ash Wednesday involving extra services. He has set up a Lenten group on Facebook for the season. He is also working on a pod cast for the Summer. The Tech side of worship is continuing to move forward.

Pastor Rod reported that the Lenten season involves a great deal of planning with both Bethany and Immanuel. The Nouwen book study is continuing. He has scheduled a Baptism in May. The Synod

Assembly is the week following Easter and there is still room for additional members to attend this event. He is working to schedule a meeting with the hiring team for the Children's Ministry position. He has discussed stewardship with the Board of Trustees, questioning how we identify our gifts and the how we are going to invest ourselves to the world.

Ruth Melby spoke to the council about the Connections Through Food Grant. The purpose of this Grant fits into the ELCA Domestic Hunger mission. The time frame extends from now until February of 2025. The three goals of the Partnership are:

- 1. Community strategy
- 2. Improve the quality of food production
- 3. Be a catalyst to community resources.

The Financial report was given by Jennifer Jenkins and is published in the Messenger.

The Bethany Health & Vitality Committee reported that Carolyn Price will be leaving the committee and Kathy Leuwerke will be joining. Council Retreat is scheduled for Sunday, March 27 from 10:30-1:00. Board reports were presented. Meeting was adjourned for Sunday morning worship. This will focus on God's abundance and how we can be grateful. Wednesday evenings will be looking at characters in the Bible and contemplating how God is using you. He also reported that Ann will be attending a meeting focused on the youth gathering. The Synod will help with replacing the youth gathering that was cancelled.

Pastor Zech reported on his participation in continuing education with a focus on coaching in his ministry. He is also taking a course on digital ministry and ethics. His work continues with the Interlink Ministry and Hybrid team. His family has lived through two weeks of COVID.

Financial Report was given and is published in the Messenger.
Council is requesting a report from the Hospitality, Vitality
Team to review how things are going with our Bethany partnership.
The desire is to keep a form of healthy communication between congregations.

The Children's Education Position is looking for a replacement at the end of the Spring term. This would be a quarter time position.

Take off your shoes and stay a while



When do you feel most welcome? Is it when you stop by for a visit and are not invited in? Most likely not, but if you're an introvert who knows. Is it when you are invited to stop in for a little bit? Maybe, depends on what you had planned. Or what if you're invited in with these words, come on in take off your shoes and stay a while? That is definitely a moment when you feel welcomed.

In the middle of April, we finally make it to Holy Week. I've said it before and I'll say it again, my favorite time of the church year. Each service, each moment of the week brings with it new experiences, new expectations, new excitement, and new wonderings. And while each year has moments that are the same, each year has moments that are different based on how you are feeling and where you are at in life. For many if us this is a week where we walk in on Palm Sunday but we don't take off our shoes because we are ready to run to Easter, and skip past the downer parts of the season, specifically Good Friday. That's not me and I know that's not everyone. So this year I invite you to take off your shoes and stay awhile.

One of the themes for this week from "Full to the Brim" is take off your shoes. Take off your shoes and be immersed in the week, When I think of what this week can feel like, it's sort of like going to the ocean. I come to the ocean with dirty feet, they may hurt from the rocks on the beach, and they may be covered in sand or mud from the area. But once you put your feet in the ocean all that

washes away, they feel renewed from the cool water, you feel the old sand wash off and your feet may even sink into the soft sand, you may even play in the water and watch the sand be washed off your feet repeatedly. But when you leave you do not feel or look the same as when you came to the beach.

So come on into Holy Week take off your shoes and stay a while, especially during the craziness of life. Stay a while in the Word as we welcome Jesus into Jerusalem on Palm Sunday. Stay a while as we gather around the Lord's Table on Maundy Thursday and are filled with the body and blood of Jesus. Stay awhile even when it's uncomfortable to look upon the cross and you want to flee because you know why he is up there. Stay awhile in the awkwardness of Saturday wondering what's changed. Stay awhile at the empty tomb, see that it is indeed empty, leave your old shoes and put on some new ones as you run renewed to share the news with everyone you meet. Take that cup, that life, that is full to the brim and head out into the world inviting others to take off their shoes and stay a while, in the presence of Jesus the risen Christ.

I pray this upcoming Holy Week renews you, and fills your cup not only to the brim, but over the edge with God's awesomeness that is fully seen this time of year.

Have a blessed Easter and see you in worship one way or another interlinked in Christ.

Hopeful is the word Matt Polsdofer, a member (now former member) of Immanuel Lutheran Church (Forest City, Iowa) and a Pastor at Immanuel Lutheran Church of Rock Rapids, Iowa, would use to describe the church.

Polsdofer grew up in Forest City but did not go to Immanuel until his wife, Jenni, and him moved back after graduating from Concordia University Chicago.

"When we came back, we did what anybody does, you know, you kind of do this church shopping, so to speak," Polsdofer said. He

recalled that they had met a woman in a red dress whom to this day remains a mystery.

"She was super friendly and welcoming to us," he said. "So, we were just like this is a place we need to be and so from 2010 to 2019 that's where we went to church."

Polsdofer who enjoys worshipping God with music remembers that his first memory of Immanuel was a Wednesday night when the praise band played a song that he used to sing as a child.

"As a kid, I really liked singing 'Go Tell It on The Mountain', but you're screaming it right, and they played it that night and that was one of my first memories, hearing the drums and the guitar and I really like that," he said. "Music has been really important."

Polsdofer moved to southern California in 2019 for his seminary program. While he was in college, Polsdofer thought about going to seminary but he kind of gave up on it. However, Pastor Rod and his wife, Renae, were encouraging of him going to seminary and Pastor Zech had also spoken to him about it.

"Immanuel has been a tremendous place of growth for me in my faith and where I found my calling because I was not going to do this but, here I am as a pastor," he said. "The other great thing is I had my ordination in Forest City at Immanuel."

As a newly ordained pastor, Polsdofer finds that working with the youth and visiting nursing homes or assisted living facilities are the most spiritually energizing to him. "It's really awesome to get to enter into their lives and be a support for them," he said on working with middle and high school youths.

To Polsdofer, faith and the church are the center of life. He believes that the primary role of the church is to have a place that is safe for people to come and gather, hear that they are loved by God and that they are important.
