Immanuel has been blessed with a \$20,000 grant from ELCA Domestic Hunger for it's Connections Through Food (CTF) programming. Not only is it exciting to receive funds, but ELCA only funds existing programs which are successful and have potential to grow and meet more needs with additional funds. Immanuel's efforts and current Wednesday Evening Meal team were affirmed by this funding. Immanuel currently serves as many as 150 meals during the school year, this is likely to grow with community needs increasing and the communication team letting more people know about CTF. CTF is not just the Wednesday Evening Meal. Expanding connections with our congregation, community, and the ELCA is all part of the plan.

Letter from Pastor Rod

What Can I Do? Become a Prophetic Voice!

In 1 Corinthians 13 we read a beautiful poem declaring the nature of Godly love. It is often read at weddings and we even read it occasionally in worship. It is so beautiful we typically stop reading when we reach the end of the chapter. With this article, I invite you to keep reading; slip into chapter fourteen with me.

For a few months now, Immanuel's church council has been discussing strategies for reengaging our church family in worship and in ministry as we emerge from the pandemic. As I read 1 Corinthians 14, I am touched by how it speaks to this issue.



The text reads: Pursue love and strive for the spiritual gifts, and especially that you may prophesy. 2For those who speak in a tongue do not speak to other people but to God; for nobody understands them, since they are speaking mysteries in the Spirit. 3On the other hand, those who prophesy speak to other people for their building up and encouragement and consolation. 4Those who speak in a tongue build up themselves, but those who prophesy build up the church.

As Paul closes chapter 13 by stating, "Now faith, hope, and love abide, these three, and the greatest of these is love", he then opens chapter fourteen by imploring the community to "pursue love." This isn't romantic love but Godly love; it is love that never ends, never quits, never gives up, never runs out, and never disconnects.

Paul then couples love with prophesy. People typically think prophesy is predicting future events. That isn't a biblical understanding, instead biblically the word means, "telling the truth." In verses two and three Paul says of prophecy, first it is not self-serving, and it is spoken to other people for three reasons: 1) for building up, 2) for encouragement, and 3) for consolation.

The translation of these nouns into English falls short in their true meaning. Let's take a look at the three reasons in Greek (the original language of the New Testament).

- 1.Building up: Oikodomha the act of building up in a way that promotes another's growth in wisdom, piety, happiness, and holiness in God.
- 2.Encouragement: Paraklesis a calling or summons for admonition or encouragement. An admonition is a loving rebuke and encouragement is a pat on the back meant to initiate movement.
- 3. Consolation: Paramuthia an address whether made for the purpose of persuading, arousing, stimulating, calming, or consoling. In other words, this is an address made to motivate another in the Spirit of and relationship with God.

Prophecy therefore is about speaking in a way that builds up, motivates, and strengthens people to be "the church," which is the called, gathered, and enlightened people of God. In comparing the spiritual gift of speaking in tongues to prophesy, Paul writes in verse four, "speaking in tongues builds up the self, while those who prophesy build up the church"

This brings us back to the reengagement question. How can we as a congregation reengage people? What can you do? First, recognize that God wants the church to be built up and whole and that means gathering

people. Those present can work towards gathering others by prophesying in the spirit of the three movements above.

If you are one who is currently distant from the church or has fallen out of the rhythm to which God has called us, please know that you are loved by God and this community and we long for your return. Let me also say, the church needs you and the gifts you have to share in order to be whole.

The Greek word for "church" is "ekklesia". This word simply means a gathering of people called out of their homes into a public assembly. The word is formed from the words, ek, meaning "out of" and the word "kaleo" meaning called. God called you and me out of darkness through the Spirit into life through Holy Baptism, and God continues to call you and me now, out of ourselves, and into the pubic gathering to share and to receive love. Let us prophesy to friends, neighbors, and others who are not connected with a church, inviting them to reengage. This, I think is our best strategy for reengagement.

How does your garden grow?

I had a pastor tell me once that our faith is either growing or it is dying. "There is no such thing as a stagnant faith," he said. Pentecost is the season of the church year promoting growth in our faith.

So.... how does your garden grow? Not your vegetable garden, but your faith garden. Are you reading your Bible? Are you saying your morning and evening prayers this summer? Are you attending worship in-person or online? Are you telling others how much God has done for you? The way you answer these questions may suggest the answer to whether your garden of faith is growing or dying. I pray it's growing.

God wants us to grow in faith, love, and obedience to him. God has given us everything we need to grow in him: his word, his son, his claim on our lives in baptism, etc., etc. God wants us to thrive and flourish in our faith, but God isn't going to sit on us and force us, or stop us from doing the many things that may distract us from him. The door is open for anyone and everyone to come to God and the Spirit will motivate us, but God will never force God's self upon us.

In Luke 14 Jesus tells a parable about this: One of the dinner guests sitting with Jesus, on hearing this, said to him, 'Blessed is anyone who will eat bread in the kingdom of God!' 16Then Jesus said to him, 'Someone gave a great dinner and invited many. 17At the time for the dinner he sent his slave to say to those who had been invited, "Come; for everything is ready now." 18But they all alike began to make excuses saying things like, "I have bought a piece of land, and I must go out and see it; "I have bought five yoke of oxen, and I am going to try them out; and "I have just been married, and therefore I cannot come. Please accept my apologies," they all said. Upon hearing their excuses, the owner of the house became angry and said to his slave, "Go out at once into the streets and bring in the poor, the crippled, the blind, and the lame, and go out into the roads and lanes, and compel people to come in, so that my house may be filled. 24For I tell you, none of those who were invited will taste my dinner."

God isn't going to force us to come to him for life and nourishment, but God has opened the door and wants us to come to him, to eat his word, his body and blood, and to be nourished for growth. Come to Jesus. Come to worship. Come to life. Grow your life in Him!

Missionary Karen will be visiting Immanuel on Sunday, July 24. She will deliver a message during the worship service and will show a PowerPoint presentation during a special brunch immediately following worship. Board members will host the brunch—egg bakes, fruit, cinnamon rolls.

The July-September mission emphasis will be the two Bible Camps that Immanuel is a member of—Riverside Lutheran Bible Camp and Ingham/Okoboji Lutheran Bible Camp.

The Board of Trustees met on June 13 at the church. May income was \$38,244.55 and expenses were \$51,567.11 with a negative (\$13,322.56) for the month. YTD is a negative (\$18,500.06) compared to a negative (\$18,988.03) for 2021. Above normal expenses included the quarterly insurance payment of \$5,587.25.

Endowment: Nothing presented. Undesignated disbursements remain at \$15,805.30

Property Committee: Mike Oleson is going to ask Jeff Haugen for a quote to trim the overhanging locust tree limbs or remove the whole trees on the parsonage garage side. The parsonage roof was new in 1998 making it 24 years old.

New Business: Parsonage budget may need to be adjusted up in next year planning. Discussed concern on having small rider mower/bagger for the church lawn.

Personnel Committee: no report.

Old Business: Bethany Lutheran staff sharing and Quarterly vitality group update: Vitality group is in place.

Synod Assembly Recap

The Western Iowa Synod of the ELCA hosted it's 2022 Synod Assembly on Fri.-Sat., April 22-23 at the Sioux City Convention Center. Pastor Rod, Pastor Zech, Ann Hunhoff, and Dave and Ruth Melby represented Immanuel and were part of the approximately 200 voting members at the Assembly. This was the first in-person Assembly since 2019.

The theme for this year's Assembly was "Some Assembly Required". Our tables were decorated with hard hats and construction tape along with Legos and other items with which to create. First Call Pastors in the Synod, including Immanuel's, Matt Polsdofer assembled the worship space in a processional during Opening Worship Friday night. An old door resting on sawhorses became the altar and candle holders were fashioned out of orange pylons, bringing home the theme.

New at this year's Assembly was a time of matching t-shirt clad attendees fanning across the Sioux City area in groups of 15 to

20 to share a light lunch, to learn about a host ministry, and to roll up our sleeves and serve people in the community. Dave and Ruth worked together with others to stock a recently established food pantry which is serving neighbors of a ELCA church in Sioux City. We helped to shelve a ton of food stuffs and noted that issues surrounding food insecurity and the resources through the lowa Food Bank system mirrored these things in Forest City.

Immanuel is one of the largest congregations of the Synod. Immanuel's delegation also had one of the longest drives to attend the Assembly. Immanuel's Pastor Rod was engaged in the dialog from the floor regarding several resolutions and the budget. While the 2/3 majority vote to restore the current fiscal year budgeted funding to Campus Ministry which was put in play by a motion by Pastor Rod was defeated by only a handful of votes, the assembly benefitted from his reasoned and impassioned effort.

Immanuel was recognized for being one of the two congregations in the Western Iowa Synod who received grant funding from ELCA Domestic Hunger this year for our Connections Through Food ministry. In addition, Pastor Zech was named to the Synod's ABC Committee which is responsible for planning the 2023 Assemby.
