Letter from Pastor Rod

Do Not be Afraid!

Every month when I prepare to write I ask the Lord, "what do you want me to say to your flock this month?" As I contemplate that

question in late June 2023, the answer that I get is this: "Have no fear little flock, for the Lord, your God is with you always, even to the end of the age."

Voices from every sector seem to tell us the world is unraveling and spinning out of control. From climate change, to a shortage of goods and services, to politics and threats against democracy, to financial markets, to the church and her decline, to clashes between moralists and social justice voices, there are more than enough voices



reminding us of the uncertainty and instability of the world around us. These voices can be overwhelming, disheartening, and crippling to the human spirit.

I'm not saying we should ignore these voices. We're in the midst of unfathomable societal change. We should always make our best human effort to be godly stewards of all things and care for the world in godly ways. In the midst of a chaotic world, we must hold on to the truth that someone greater than the powers of this earth, greater than the powers of nature, and greater than the systems of man is the one who holds life together. If the world unravels, it is unraveling in God's hands. God is trustworthy in the building up and in the unraveling.

The Apostle Paul writes in Ephesians, 6:12, "For our struggle is not against enemies of blood and flesh, but against the rulers, against the authorities, against the cosmic powers of this present darkness, against the spiritual forces of evil in the heavenly places. These forces want us to believe all is unraveling, and to unravel us with it. The powers and principalities of evil want to turn us into a hopeless and fearful lot.

Have no feal little flock, the world is in the hands of a God who can bring life out of death; order out of chaos; and can breathe new life into dry bones. When we trust God and hold on to one another and stay focused on God's mission to care for each other and the world around us, then there is hope.

Paul continues in verse 14 "Stand therefore, and fasten the belt of truth around your waist, and put on the breastplate of righteousness. 15 As shoes for your feet put on whatever will make you ready to proclaim the gospel of peace. 16 With all of these, take the shield of faith, with which you will be able to quench all the flaming arrows of the evil one. 17 Take the helmet of salvation, and the sword of the Spirit, which is the word of God. Pray in the Spirit at all times in every prayer and supplication. To that end keep alert and always persevere in supplication for all the saints.

Dear church, let us renew our courage under the armor of God. Let us be bold and generous disciples, let us love across borders, let us never turn inward but always follow Jesus outwardly to a hurting world. Let us persevere in faith and give ourselves daily together into God's mission.

The Mission & Outreach Board met via Zoom on Wednesday, June 14. Six members were present. Opening devotions were given by Keith Walker.

Sixty geraniums were sold during the Red Geranium fundraiser, and \$544.00 was raised. This money will be applied to our \$5,000 missionary covenant commitment. Board members are thankful for the generosity of those who purchased the geraniums. An additional \$1,617.70 is needed to meet our \$5,000 covenant commitment to Missionary Karen Anderson. A noisy offering was held on June 18. (\$205.44)

The mission emphasis for the third quarter (July-September) was discussed, and Bible camps were chosen as the third quarter emphasis. Mission gifts received throughout this period will be divided equally between these three camps: Ingham/Okoboji Lutheran Bible Camp, Lutheran Lakeside Camp, and Riverside Lutheran Bible Camp.

A Giving Tree has been decorated with the requested items for the two Waldorf international students who are staying on campus this summer. Some food items and several gift cards were received and passed on to the students. Patryk from Poland and John from South Africa. Thank you to those who have donated items so far! Beyond the giving of items, folks are welcome to make connections with them and personally get together.

Board members will be reviewing the section in the constitution regarding the responsibilities of the Mission & Outreach Board to see if any changes are needed.

The next meeting will be on Wednesday, July 12.

The Board of Trustees met on June 12, 2023 at the church. Income was \$55,748.39 and expenses were \$48,572.27 with a positive \$7,176.12 for the month of May. YTD is a negative (\$19,176.71) compared to a negative (\$13,322.56) for 2022. There were several large offerings and an insurance payment of \$6.425.00.

Endowment: Board of Trustees will review the charter next month.

Property Committee: The boiler removal and installation may start sooner than August.

Personnel Committee: nothing presented.

New Business: Pastor Rod and Kathy McEnelly will have discussions with Four Oaks who is looking for a new location to house students as their current location is for sale by the Garner Hayfield Ventura school district. Possible sunday school rooms are being considered.

Old Business: a.) Hunger grants a job description for a Grant Manager was approved for the 3-year grant.

Council met on June 12th with an In Person/Zoom hybrid format. Nine members, both pastors and the pastoral intern were present. Meeting was called to order by President Kathy McEnelly and May minutes were approved. Board reports,

Pastors' reports and the Intern report were presented and approved. Action items from the staff/council retreat were reviewed, with each group reporting on the progress of their initiative. In old business, the council again discussed the ideas of replacing front pews with chairs, the proposed choir loft renovation and new digital signage in front of the church. All of these items are in the discussion phase only; no action has been taken. The council approved the hiring of a parttime grant manager for the Food Grant as our revisions to the grant request were approved by the ELCA. In new business, the council spent time discussing various ideas to improve the financial picture. With Pastor Hopp's sabbatical approved to start at Thanksgiving time and going through February, we will need to do the 2024 budget early this year and talked about moving the annual meeting from February to November. Business financials can be found elsewhere in the Messenger.

When Joy Came to Stay






Pax
