Vacation Bible School "Maker Fun Factory"

Vacation Bible School will be held at Immanuel June 5th – June 9th from 9:00 a.m. to noon. VBS is open to all children preschool age through 5th grade. You can register your child(ren) on-line at immanuelfamily.com or in the church office. The registration deadline has past so the cost of VBS is \$10 per child.

This year's theme is Maker Fun Factory where the kids will learn they were created by God and built for a purpose. At Maker Fun Factory, curious kids become hands-on inventors who discover they're lovingly crafted by God! Kids will learn one important Bible point each day. The Bible Point is reinforced daily through Bible adventures, key Bible verses, songs, snacks and hands-on activities that help kids know more about their Maker-God.

We are asking students to bring offering each day to VBS. On Mondays, students should bring pennies, Tuesday nickels, Wednesday dimes, Thursday quarters and Friday a dollar. Our offering this year will help fund medical equipment and supplies to be shipped to those in need who are living in Tanzania.

At the end of VBS, the students will put on a program on Friday, June 9th at noon in the Sanctuary. The program is open to everyone to come watch the kids share the excitement of the week. The VBS kids will also be singing in Worship on Sunday, June 11th at 9:45 am. We can't wait to see what the kids will learn at the 'Maker Fun Factory' VBS!

Why Red Doors?

The significance of red doors on a church according to Dr. Richard Hoefler, dean of chapel at Lutheran Theological Southern Seminary. "Christians have entered into worship, into the presence of God, through the blood of Christ." It is also said that a red door in the Lutheran Church harkens back to the time of Martin Luther, who posted his 95 Theses on the red doors of the Castle Church in Wittenberg, Germany. The red doors symbolize the blood of Christ, which is our entry into salvation.

Painting the doors red started in the Middle Ages, doors were painted red for the blood of Christ and the sign of the cross; Father, Son, and the Holy Ghost. Red is used as a reminder of the Passover and a sign that the Holy Spirit is there. Today many churches proclaim with their red doors that their churches are a haven for emotional and spiritual healing, and are a place of refuge and safety, forgiveness and reconciliation. The red doors now show that the warmth, light, and presence of the Holy Spirit is there for everyone who enters.

The Assembly is the primary decision-making body of the WIS (which Immanuel is located in) and gathers every year. Voting members from its congregations, together with other leaders of the ELCA, and guided by the Holy Spirit, discuss the work of the church and make decisions reflecting the challenges we face serving our neighbors—locally and globally—in the name of Jesus Christ.

The WIS is OPENING DOORS to health care! An initiative in conjunction with Global Health Ministries and our brothers and sisters in Tanzania, Immanuel is having a drive to help collect some of these items and bring to Assembly. Can you help with any of the items:

LETTER FROM PASTOR ROD

PENTECOST AND THE WORK OF THE SPIRIT!

Jeremiah 23: 19 & 29

"Behold, the storm of the LORD! Wrath has gone forth, a whirling tempest; it will burst upon the head of the wicked. The anger of the LORD will not turn back until he has executed and accomplished the intents of his heart. In the latter days you will understand it clearly....Is not my word like fire, declares the Lord, and like a hammer that breaks the rock in pieces?"



Pastor Rod

Acts 2:1-4

"When the day of Pentecost arrived, they were all together in one place. And suddenly there came from heaven a sound like a mighty rushing wind, and it filled the entire house where they were sitting. And divided tongues, as of fire, appeared to them, and rested on each one of them. And they were all filled with the Holy Spirit and began to speak in other tongues as the Spirit gave them utterance."

On the day of Pentecost (Sunday, June 4) our congregation will sing a song titled, God of Tempest, God of Whirlwind. The first verse asks: "God of tempest, God of whirlwind as on Pentecost descend! Drive us out from sheltered comfort; past these walls your people send! Sweep us into costly service, there with Christ to bear the cross; there with Christ to bear the cross!"

This and the second verse of the hymn reflect a side of the Spirit seen in Jeremiah 23 above. The Spirit of God is here revealed as a stormy spirit that bursts out against those who are opposing God. In the case of Jeremiah 23, God is speaking out against false prophets saying, "'Both prophet and priest are ungodly; even in my house I have found their evil,' declares the Lord.... Thus says the Lord of hosts: 'Do not listen to the words of the prophets who prophesy to you, filling you with vain hopes. They speak visions of their own minds, not from the mouth of the Lord. They say continually to those who despise the word of the Lord, 'It shall be well with you'; and to everyone who stubbornly follows his own heart, they say, 'No disaster shall come upon you.'" We see this same side of the spirit in other parts of scripture, (see Rev. 3:14-17).

On the day of Pentecost as told in Acts 2, we see another side of the Spirit. Once again the wind is blowing and it is a noisy rush of a mighty wind. It sounds a lot like the mighty whirling tempest in Jeremiah 23. This time however, the Holy Spirit, "fills the whole house where the followers of Jesus are sitting and a divided tongue as of fire rested on each one and they began to speak in other tongues as the Spirit gave them utterance."

The Spirit not only convicts and contends with sinners in order to transform them, but it also gathers, gifts, and sends us from our gatherings into the broken world in order to use our giftedness to bring light and life and salvation to all people. This is the gift of God for the people of God that brings us life.

Verse four of God of Tempest, God of Whirlwind prays: "God of passion; God unsleeping, stir in us love's restlessness! Where the people cry in anguish, may we share your heart's distress. Rouse us from content with evil; claim us for your kingdom's work, claim us for your kingdom's work."

Sow Generously

When I was a young man the first calling on my life was to be a farmer. I started farming with my dad and at that time we had an old John Deere planter. With that old planter we planted or sowed 24,000 seeds in every acre. That sounds like a lot doesn't it?

After a couple of years we came to realize that with that old planter and 24,000 seeds per acre we were not getting, nor were we going to get the yields we wanted. So the next season we bought a newer White planter. With the advances in planter technology we decided to increase our seed planting population to 30,000 seeds per acre. That year we had the best yields we had ever had. The more seeds we planted, the better yields we harvested.

In 2 Corinthians 9 the Apostle Paul is talking to Christians about giving to the needs of other Christians and he says this: "The point is this: whoever sows sparingly will also reap sparingly, and whoever sows bountifully will also reap bountifully. Each one must give as he has decided in his heart, not reluctantly or under compulsion, for God loves a cheerful giver."

Paul was encouraging his people to give generously and abundantly to the needs of others. To encourage them he used a planting or sowing analogy. He said that if you only plant a few seeds, then you will harvest a small crop. If however you are willing to plant abundant seeds, then you will harvest a larger more satisfying crop.

Walking Together in the Holy Land

May 2017 – Greetings from Jerusalem (excerpts from a recent newsletter)

We continue in our work as Young Adult in Global Mission (YAGM) Coordinators, walking with our YAGM and the Evangelical Lutheran Church in Jordan and Holy Land (ELCJHL).

The weather has spiked toward its hot summer norms. At this time of year, Jerusalem is the coolest place in the country (because of its high elevation). Askadinya fruit are ripening on the tree and the ever so brief apricot season is upon us. The warm winds that mark Pentecost are making their presence heard and felt; a balm on a hot day and a reminder that the comfort of the Holy Spirit is ever upon us.

Our YAGMs continue their service, mostly teaching in the ELCJHL Schools. It is a gift to watch these young adults grow over the year, especially as they become more confident in their teaching abilities and more known by their companions.

We went on retreat in March with our YAGMs spending time in worship, reflection and community with our companions in Amman, Jordan and at the Baptismal Site at the Jordan River. They also had time to take in many of Jordan's treasures and red-rock landscapes. In our time together, we explored themes of baptism and vocation.

We four Grangaards boarded a plane early on Good Friday for the US for our April meetings and visits. We stopped by Colin's parents' home to celebrate Easter at Colin's home church: First Lutheran in Tiffin, Ohio. Josie liked being with Grandma & Grandpa, going to the Easter Egg Roll, and singing Alleluia! In Chicago we extended invitations to eight young adults to join us as YAGMs in 2017-18. They will begin their service with orientation in mid-August. Then we hit the road to visit churches in Lower Michigan, the first part of our home assignment visits; we'll pick it back up in July.

As always, we give thanks for your support in this work. What a blessing to walk together as Christ's body. May God bless, keep, and guide you.

Pentecost Travis Beck

“When the day of Pentecost had come, they were all together in one place. And suddenly from heaven there came a sound like the rush of a violent wind, and it filled the entire house where they were sitting. Divided tongues, as of fire, appeared among them, and a tongue rested on each of them. All of them were filled with the Holy Spirit and began to speak in other languages, as the Spirit gave them ability. Now there were devout Jews from every nation under heaven living in Jerusalem. And at this sound the crowd gathered and was bewildered, because each one heard them speaking in the native language of each.” (Acts 2:1-6)

What are we to make of this strange festival, with wind, fire, and foreign languages? First, “they were all together in one place.” Just like the law was given to the whole people of Israel, the spirit is poured out on the whole community of believers—it is not a private possession for each individual believer.

Second, there is a great sound of wind and foreign language and “at this sound the crowd gathered.” The arrival of the spirit is not private or hidden but is public, dramatic, even noisy. It does not frighten the bystanders but draws them in “from every nation.”

Third, “each one heard them speaking in the native language of each.” Divine revelation isn’t limited to one people, one language, one time, or one place. The Word is being made available to all people, in all times, in all places. In Peter’s sermon to the crowd on Pentecost, he affirms this when he says that “the promise is for you, for your children, and for all who are far away, everyone whom the Lord our God calls to him.” The confusion of Babel is being reversed, transcended; the scattered people of God are being drawn together.

What lessons are in this story that can help us understand our worship differently? First, worship is corporate. It is not the private possession of each individual believer, though we often treat it this way by asking if I was fed, if I enjoyed the sermon, and so on. But worship, at its best, is for the whole community of believers, and this raises different questions: Did the worship help the congregation grow together? Did it help them bridge their differences? Did it help unite them in heart and mind?

Second, worship is public, dramatic, even noisy. It is not spectacle for its own sake, to be sure; but it does not try to hide the messiness of what it is to be human. It makes room for crying children, for laughter and humor, for dancing and moving, and everything that comes with being alive.

Third, worship is richly expressive and diverse. The late 20th century saw an explosion of worship styles and formats designed to appeal to certain demographics and personal tastes. This kind of worship seems to me a recreating of Babel rather than a reversal of it. Worship, at its best, draws the scattered people of God together rather than empowers them even more strongly to divide and separate.

It is this kind of radical community that drew new converts to the faith in the book of Acts: “They devoted themselves to the apostles’ teaching and fellowship, to the breaking of bread and the prayers. [...] All who believed were together and had all things in common [...]. Day by day, as they spent much time together in the temple, they broke bread at home and ate their food with glad and generous hearts, praising God and having the goodwill of all the people. And day by day the Lord added to their number those who were being saved.” May we be so bold as to model our lives on this Pentecost faith.

How do you see yourself?



Recently the middle school and high school youth did an activity and devotion that I think is a great exercise for us all to do. 

This true story is a real-life Brady Bunch. What cancer robbed two families of, God returned in a new way. A beautiful book of hope.


