Letter from Pastor Rod

I've been asked by several members for the list of scripture texts quoted on Easter Sunday as part of the "Now that's something....The darkness should have known" call and response. (If you missed it, you can find the sermon at Immanuelfamily.com.) Because of that I will share it with all of you in hopes that you might use the list for a self-guided summer Bible study or a survey of scriptures that give us hope and light in dark times. So, enjoy and use as is fitting for you.



The scriptures are full of promises that buoy our hearts and remind us that God is still rolling stones! God is still breaking the power of darkness and thwarting its claim of victory.

Deuteronomy 31: It is the Lord who goes before you. He will be with you; he will not fail you or forsake you.

Isaiah 43: But now thus says the Lord, he who created you, do not fear, for I have redeemed you; I have called you by name, you are mine.

Psalm 23: The Lord is my shepherd; I shall not want. He makes me lie down in green pastures; he leads me beside still waters; God restores my soul. 4: Even though I walk through the darkest valley, I fear no evil; for you/GOD are with me.

Psalm 27: The Lord is my light and my salvation; whom shall I fear? The Lord is the stronghold of my life; of whom shall I be afraid?

Isaiah 41: Do not fear, for I am with you, do not be afraid, for I am your God; I will strengthen you, I will help you, I will uphold you with my victorious right hand.... 13 For I, the Lord your God, hold your right hand; it is I who say to you, 'Do not fear, I will help you.'

Luke 3: And a voice came from heaven saying, "You are my Son/Child, my Beloved; in you I take delight."

John 8: Jesus says, 'I am the light of the world. Whoever follows me will never walk in darkness but will have the light of life.'

Acts 2: ... it was impossible for death to hold Jesus in its power.

Mission & Outreach

The members of the board met via ZOOM on April 13 at 4:45 p.m. Those present were: Becky Stumme, Ken Korth, Jaci Thorson, Ben Arentson, Larry and Sharen Rieffer. For devotions Sharen read from "Christ in Our Home" based on John 19:41 about Christ's life-giving presence.

The board received an update on a fellow board member, Pøtt Van Auken. Our thoughts and prayers go towards a speedy recovery for her.

Our first quarter mission emphasis for 2022 was Hunger Issues where any mission monies would go towards these three causes—in equal amounts: FC Neighborhood Food Bank, Immanuel's Wednesday night meals and Lutheran World Hunger relief. Our final total was \$1,243-- \$414 each cause.

Lenten Offerings will be going to Lutheran Services in Iowa, which among many other services help to settle the Afghan refugees in various areas in Iowa. Lenten gifts came to \$1,546 for LSI. We are blessed with such a caring congregation.

April's mission emphasis will be for the needs of the Ukrainian people. We direct our mission monies to Lutheran Disaster Response-Eastern Europe Crisis.

May and June mission monies will be designated toward our missionary, Karen Anderson, in Santiago, Chile. We have a \$5,000 covenant commitment again this year for Karen. We ask for continued support for her EPES ministry.

Thanks to some folks that donated various kitchen items for the Waldorf International Students. With these various items the "cupboard" for them is in good shape for now.

The board received word that Larry and Sharen Rieffer are resigning after seven plus years of service. There is a need for replacements so if anyone knows someone who has a heart for missions, it would be great if they would join our board. If ANYONE is interested, please contact Jaci, in the front office. Obligations as a member would be to attend the monthly meeting (2nd Wednesday of the month at 4:45—it's been via ZOOM lately) and help with some fundraising efforts—like coffees.

Trustees' Notes

Bink Keller

The Board of Trustees met on April 11 at the church and by zoom. March income was \$63,581.08 and expenses were \$57,541.71 with a positive \$6,039.37 for the month. YTD is a negative (\$10,215.40) compared to a negative (\$11,966.86) for 2021.

Endowment: \$55,000 is available with \$33,000 designated withdrawal leaving \$22,000 for the year.

Property Committee: Both elevators were inspected and licensed for annual updates. Fire extinguishers were checked and recharged by Federal Fire in Mason City. Mike Oleson will buy 2 fire extinguishers for the parsonage, one for each floor. Omega Organ and Audio to install two TVs in the sanctuary and wire a distribution amplifier to send digital signals to multiple locations, main screen, live stream, basement, and back TV. The maximum quote of \$8,344.40 quote to be paid half from Firm Foundation and half from endowment.

Personnel Committee: Policy handbook item #1250 Sexual Harassment is still being worked on.

New Business: The board toured the unused Sunday school rooms. Pastor Rod led thoughts of using some of the rooms for 1. Apartments for Waldorf students or church involved Waldorf students. 2. Apartments for Widows. 3. Childcare rooms. This will lead to more investigation in costs to meet code requirements for fire code, access, bathroom requirement, possible kitchen allowances. Summer outside services were discussed with the second Sunday of June, July, and possibly August will be outside by Waldorf Pond.

Old Business: a.) Bethany Lutheran Staff sharing and Quarterly vitality group update: One Bethany member is going off. They meet quarterly.

Parish Coucil

Council met on April 11 with an In Person/Zoom Hybrid format. Ten members and both Pastors were in attendance. Meeting was called to order by President Daryl Krieger and March minutes were approved.

Pastor Zech reported on the progress of the transept set-up with Omega Audio and Organ. He has been working on Holy Week planning, specifically the tech needs as well as the Good Friday dramatic reading put together with Joy Newcom. His work with the Interlinked Ministry has been going well with Facebook participation this season commenting that is it something to look into periodically through the year.

Pastor Rod reported on funerals and baptisms as well as the increase of hospital and care center visits. The Fifth Grade Communion classes were scheduled and conclude with foot washing on Maundy Thursday. The Lenten journey continues with Sundays focusing on Full to the Brim, and Wednesday's worship on "Awake O Sleeper, Christ is calling your name." The Children's Education position has been advertised and he would like to close the application process near the end of April. Reports from Board of Education, Trustees, Mission & Outreach and Parish Life were approved. The Financial report was given by Jennifer Jenkins and is published in the Messenger.

The Bethany/Immanuel Health & Vitality Team (HVT) was discussed, as one member leaving the team will need to be replaced.

Discussion continued from the Council Retreat concerning Immanuel's Core Values as well as the Reengagement & Invitation discussion.

Summer OUTDOOR worship for June and July will be on the 2nd Sunday of the month.

Steward the Ship

Let me talk to you about Stewardship... Ok now I know some of you are panicking, abandoned ship, and have stopped reading at this point. I get it that's sometimes what I think when I hear that very word and I'm a Pastor. But that's not what I'm talking about at this moment. No, I want to tell you a story

about Steward.

Steward was a ship, the newest one on the sea. Steward had been given all the upgrades, best looking rooms, fastest engines, a hull that could withstand hurricanes, and a crew unlike any other. Steward would sit near the shore every day, all day, but was feeling unfulfilled. I have all these wonderful gifts, and yet all I do is sit near the shore every day. I don't go out to sea and use my engines and my rooms are all empty. There must be more I have to offer otherwise why would I have these gifts? He continued to ponder what to do next, but Steward was also comfortable where he was, his engines never got tired, the crew was always happy, and his room always looked brand new. Then one day a storm blew into the area and the seas became wild and fierce. No ship was able to go out to sea to help find a lost group. Steward realized I have all these gifts and now is the time to share them and not keep them to myself. So off Steward went into the wild sea, roaring waves, rooms ready to go, and engines that could cut through any wave and move with power. Steward arrived at the scene and the crew unlike any other began to save those on the sinking ship. Once all were aboard safe and sound Steward again started up those engines and brought them all to safety on the land. After this event Steward felt fulfilled, he loved sharing his gifts he'd been given, and instead of sitting near shore waiting for a storm, he began to invite others on to the boat and gave back in ways that didn't need large waves,

but was always there ready for the next big storm. Steward the ship finally realized what stewardship could look like.

Now this story was completely made up, but it was inspired by one of the stewardship messages I heard growing up, where someone came out wearing a boat called Steward, and they explored what stewardship is. I'm not the expert of experts on this but I do know the definition of stewardship is, "the job of supervising or taking care of something." Taking care of something, maybe even someone? But how can we do that? 1 Peter 4:10 says, "As each has received a gift, use it to serve one another, as good stewards of God's varied grace." Each of us has a gift, most likely gifts. They could be financial, physical, relational, spiritual, talents, you name it. I bet we can think of something. That's why the old offertory prayer says we give ourselves, our time and our possessions which are signs of your gracious love, use us. Maybe that's a prayer we can offer up today? Maybe someone is feeling unfulfilled or burned out in one area but has other gifts to give in different ways that bring life again. I'm not going to ramble on any longer today because I'm sure you've heard this before.

But as we head into Summer and a season of growth, I invite you to take time to pray, look at who you are, what is God calling me to do, maybe even to stop, and to help steward. It may be financial, it may be with time, it may be with talent, it may be something else, who knows what seas you're being called into today. Pray about it and listen to where Steward the ship is being called into next. I pray if brings you new growth as you watch things grow around you this summer.

See you in worship one way or another interlinked in Christ.

Making All Things New, by Henri Nouwen, is a short, clean, clear book about how to begin finding the peace of mind to hear the voice of God. Nouwen acknowledges that worry is so ingrained in many people's daily lives that it seems to be an integral part of positive achievement and self-protection. Yet he explains, with devastating directness, the destructive effects of busy-ness and its attendant habit of worrying, then shows how Jesus responds to these worries, and finally describes some disciplines that "can cause our worries slowly to lose their grip on us, and which can thus allow the Spirit of God to do his recreating work."
