

Letter from Pastor Rod

Sabbatical Update

"If you are wise, you will show yourself to be a reservoir rather than a canal. For a canal spreads abroad water as it receives it, but a reservoir waits until it is filled before overflowing, and thus communicates, without loss to itself, its superabundant water. In the church at the present day, we have many canals, few reservoirs." Bernard of Clairvaux, 12th century



of Clairvaux, St. Bernard (1091-1153) was centrally responsible for the early expansion of the Cistercian Order throughout Europe. Saint Bernard

stands as one of the giants of the Christian spiritual and theological heritage, and his writings represent a peak in monastic theology and spirituality. In his treatise On Loving God he describes man's spiritual ascent to the love of God through the love of self and of neighbor. In On Consideration St. Bernard's, presents a balanced view about combining the contemplative spirit with care and responsibility for ministry in the Church.

St. Bernard was beloved for his ability to combine his uncompromising desire to foster holiness in himself and his monks with the patience of a loving father. Blessed Isaac of Stella, one of his contemporaries described him in these words: He poured out, when present, the delights with which he himself was always overflowing. To everyone he appeared so terrifying when he loved and so lovable when terrifying that, at his word or rebuke, no one ever became discouraged, no one was ever stung by impatience or consumed by envy.

On November 20, 2023 I will embark on a twelve week sabbatical. The prayer and the goal of the sabbatical will be that God will fill me as a reservoir is filled by the rain. It is time for me to stop the flow, to shut the dam gate, and let God fill and renew my spirit for ministry that I can return to pastoral ministry renewed and filled to once again open the flow of God's love through preaching, pastoral care, teaching, and leading in the church. The teachings of Jesus and the writings of Saint Bernard of Clairvaux will be a central focus of this sabbatical.

The Sabbatical team is in place. Members are Kay Sorenson, Bink Keller, and Keith Walker. I so appreciate their willingness to walk with me in planning and implementing this sabbatical. During the sabbatical, these team members are willing to field questions or concerns from you and to assist Pastor Zech and Intern Elizabeth in problem solving when issues arise. Our congregational president, Kathy McEnelly and church council members will also be available to support staff and congregation during this time. Should you have a need to reach me during this time, please reach out to one of these team members, a council member, or Pastor Zech to discuss the issue first to see if a resolution can be found.

On Sunday November 19th we will have a brief sending ceremony to send me on my way. I pray you too will be refreshed in our time of separation, and that you will have a fantastic Thanksgiving, Advent, and Christmas season. May our hunger to work together in ministry bubble up in renewal during this time.

Ecclesiastes 3 states: For everything there is a season, and a time for every matter under heaven: A time to be born, and a time to die; a time to plant, and a time to pluck up what is planted;....

We could add, a time to be emptied and a time to be filled. Thanks again for the blessing and gift of sabbatical.

The Mission & Outreach Board met via Zoom on Wednesday, September 13. All members were present. Opening devotions were given by Becky Stumme.

To date, \$524.50 has been received for the third quarter mission emphasis (Bible Camps). Noisy offerings for the third quarter mission emphasis (Bible Camps) will be held on Sunday, September 24, and on Wednesday, September 27.

The mission emphasis for October will be Missionary Karen. The emphasis for November will be determined at the October Board meeting.

The Mission & Outreach Board has been assigned to serve as the host of the October 8th potluck.

\$821.91 is needed to meet our \$5,000 covenant commitment to Missionary Karen Anderson.

After conferring with Council, a decision was made to keep our 2024 covenant commitment to Missionary Karen Anderson at \$5,000.

A decision was made to continue supporting the needs of the Waldorf international students. More information will be sought for items for an interview closet.

The Evangelical Lutheran Church of the Magallanes posted some pictures on Facebook commemorating the 50th anniversary of the military coup in Chile on September 11th. Some of the pictures show the lighting of candles so that it never happens again. Missionary Karen also wrote and shared stories of how the military coup changed the lives of the people in Chile and her life as a college student.

The Board of Trustees met on September 11 at the church. August Income was \$46,607.21 and expenses were \$53,294.74 with a negative (\$6,687.83) for the month of August. YTD is a negative (\$29,920.50) compared to a negative (\$35,338.62) for 2022. Income item 29 is Four Oaks for \$1,344.75 and quarterly insurance expense was \$6,472. Eighteen giving units were lost due to transfers and deaths.

In This Moment





From #1 New York Times bestselling author Karen Kingsbury comes an inspiring Baxter Family novel about a beloved high school principal who starts a Bible Study to improve the lives of his struggling students, only to become the national focus of a controversial lawsuit.

Hamilton High Principal Wendell Quinn wants to see real change in his community, so he starts a voluntary after-school Bible Study and prayer

program called Raise the Bar. He knows he is risking his job by leading the program, but before long, Raise the Bar meetings are standing room only. A year later, violence and gang activity are sharply down, test scores are up, and drug use and teen pregnancy have plummeted. The program is clearly working—until one parent files a lawsuit, claiming Wendell has violated his daughter's rights.

Based on the story of a real family, this second book in the historical Beyond the Orphan Train series reminds us that God never leaves us, no matter how far we journey to find home.

Miracles from Heaven



Based on the incredible true story of the Beam family. When Christy (Jennifer Garner) discovers her 10-year-old daughter Anna (Kylie Rogers) has a rare, incurable disease, she becomes a ferocious advocate for her daughter's healing as she searches for a solution. After Anna has a freak accident, an extraordinary miracle unfolds in the wake of her dramatic rescue that leaves medical specialists mystified, her family restored and their community inspired.

Dolphin Tale



In an inspiring story of the bond between animals and humans, a boy named Sawyer discovers an injured dolphin, who is brought to a marine hospital and named Winter. Unfortunately, her injuries cost Winter her tail, without which she may not survive. But with Sawyer's devotion, a marine biologist's (Harry Connick Jr.) and the brilliance of a prosthetist (Morgan Freeman) charged with creating a new tail, Winter may receive a second chance at life.

Staircase



This 95-minute film on a bare-bones DVD aired on CBS in 1998. It is an uplifting feel-good movie that recalls the style of Hallmark and Lifetime made-for-TV films, but "The Staircase" has an unexpected spiritual depth that puts it a cut above those other productions. Barbara Hershey plays an ailing Catholic mother superior whose only wish is to see the Sisters of Loretto chapel in Santa Fe completed before she dies. William Peterson is the mysterious carpenter

who volunteers to build a spiral staircase after the original builders forget to provide access to the chapel's choir loft. Based on the real-life Loretto chapel, now a museum attached to a hotel in Santa Fe, this film excels at suggesting the miraculous in everyday human qualities rather than hitting the viewer over the head with special effects or heavy-handed allegory.


health for the poor in Chile.
